At age 15, you can apply for a learner's permit after passing the vision screening and written knowledge test. With a permit, you're allowed to drive when accompanied by a licensed driver who is at least 21 years old. After holding the learner's permit for at least 12 months, drivers 16 and older who have completed their driver education course can apply for an intermediate license. This license allows you to drive without supervision from 6 AM to 10 PM. At other times, you must be accompanied by a licensed driver aged 21 or older. After holding the intermediate license for six months and turning 17, you can apply for an operator's license with no restrictions. DMV will let you take the test on a computerized testing station. If you need help with how it works, ask your examiner for additional information before you start the test. You must be at least 15 years old to apply for a learner's permit in Mississippi. This age requirement applies to all first-time permit applicants regardless of prior driving experience. To apply for a learner's permit in Mississippi, you must bring: Primary ID (birth certificate or passport) Social Security card or proof of your Social Security number Two proofs of Mississippi residency (utility bills, school records, etc.) If your name has changed from what appears on your primary ID, documentation of the name change Payment for the application fee If you're applying for a REAL ID compliant license, additional documentation may be required. Check the Mississippi Department of Public Safety website for current accepted documents. Yes, if you're under 17, a parent or legal guardian must: Accompany you to the Driver Service Bureau office Sign your permit application form Give consent for you to receive a learner's permit Accept financial responsibility for you The application process in Mississippi is as follows: Gather all required documents (ID, residency proof, etc.) Go to your local Driver Service Bureau office (with a parent or guardian if you're under 18) Fill out the application form Pay the application fee Take the vision screening Take the knowledge test Mississippi does not currently offer online applications for first-time learner's permits. You must go to a Driver Service Bureau office in person to complete the process. The Mississippi Department of Public Safety charges a fee for a learner's permit. If you are 17 or older: Driver education is not required, but it is still recommended to help you become a safer driver. If you are under 17, you will need a signed affidavit from a parent, legal guardian, or teacher attesting that they have witnessed you safely and lawfully operate a motor vehicle for at least 50 hours. To convert your learner's permit to a driver's license in Mississippi: If you are under 17: Hold your permit for at least 12 months Complete an approved driver education course Complete at least 50 hours of supervised driving practice Pass the behind-the-wheel test Pay the required fees If you are 17 or older: Hold your permit for at least 6 months Practice driving with your permit Pass the behind-the-wheel test Pay the required fees Mississippi's graduated licensing program has these stages: Learner's Permit. Must be at least 15 years old and pass the knowledge test. Valid until you qualify for the next level license or for 2 years. Intermediate License (for drivers under 17): Must be at least 16 years old Must have held a learner's permit for at least 12 months Must complete an approved driver education course Must complete 30 hours of supervised driving practice Must pass the behind-the-wheel test Regular Driver's License: For drivers 17 and older who have held a learner's permit for at least 6 months and passed the behind-the-wheel test, or for intermediate license holders when they turn 17 As a new driver with an intermediate license in Mississippi (under age 17), you cannot: Drive between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. Sunday through Thursday Drive between 11:30 p.m. and 6 a.m. on Friday and Saturday Have more than three passengers under age 21 who are not immediate family members unless accompanied by a licensed driver who is at least 21 years old Exceptions exist for driving to/from work, school functions, hunting/fishing, and if accompanied by a licensed driver who is at least 21 years old. These restrictions do not apply to regular driver's licenses issued to drivers 17 and older. Mississippi does not recognize out-of-state learner's permits. The parent or guardian must visit a Driver Service Bureau office and complete the necessary paperwork to cancel the minor's driving privilege.
