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Masters in speech pathology programs

Approximately 42 million Americans suffer from communication or swallowing disorders, necessitating specialized care provided by highly trained speech-language pathologists. These professionals are skilled in identifying, assessing, and treating various age groups with diverse backgrounds. The top 45 master's programs listed can prepare students for a career as a clinical speech-language pathologist or further studies leading to a doctoral degree. Graduate-level programs are overseen by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association, allowing graduates to obtain the Certificate of Clinical Competence from ASHA and, in some cases, state licensure. Most programs require students to complete a thesis, oral examination, or comprehensive evaluation. Students receive hands-on training through supervised clinical practicum experiences and internships in various settings such as hospitals, clinics, schools, nursing facilities, homes, and private practice. The job market for speech-language pathologists is promising, with 100 percent placement rates among graduates and above-average job growth of 18 percent from 2026. The City University of New York Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology at Brooklyn College offers a comprehensive program that prepares students for careers as speech therapists. The curriculum focuses on communication sciences and therapeutic methods, allowing students to address various speech and language issues in patients of all ages. To graduate, students must complete 59-71 credits, including 400 hours of clinical practicum and a comprehensive examination. In contrast, Brigham Young University's Master's Degree in Communication Disorders is designed to provide students with a thorough understanding of speech-language pathology. The program takes six semesters to complete and balances academic coursework with clinical practicum and a thesis project. The University of Northern Iowa's Master's of Art in Speech-Language Pathology offers students professional preparation for careers in communication sciences and disorders. Students participate in clinical practice at the university's clinic and off-campus locations, acquiring clinical competence through an internship during their final semester. Ohio University's Master of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology provides students with opportunities to engage in academic and clinical learning experiences, ultimately preparing them for dedicated and professional careers as speech therapists. In addition to obtaining their bachelor's degree, students interested in becoming speech-language pathologists can pursue optional teacher licensure through a two-year, campus-based program. The Ohio state teaching certificate is the ultimate goal for those who want to teach in the state's public schools. The Master of Arts or Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology programs from Western Michigan University, University of New Mexico, and University of Tennessee Health Science Center are designed to equip students with the skills necessary to diagnose and treat communication disorders. These programs offer comprehensive curricula that include academic coursework, clinical experiences, and inter-professional training in areas such as blindness, occupational therapy, and social work. The Master of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology from the University of Memphis offers a diverse range of roles in treating communication disorders. The 60-semester hour program covers basic processes, speech and language disorders, and audiology, with a 14-semester hour clinical practicum and seven semester hours of research coursework. Students begin their training at the Memphis Speech & Hearing Center and gain experience in various settings. The program is accredited by the Council on Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. Graduate Tuition/Fees: \$9,054 / \$17,838 The University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center's Master of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology or Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology provides multiple pathways for students to become competent professionals. The Master of Arts path is designed for those seeking academic and clinical preparation, while the Master of Science path is research-focused and does not lead to licensure. Students with a bachelor's degree in communication sciences and disorders complete the program in two years, whereas others enter laterally and complete their studies in three years. Master's programs for speech-language pathology are available at various institutions across the United States. The University of Texas at Austin offers a 32-credit program with two tracks and bilingual certification, requiring 375 hours of clinical experience. Florida State University provides a Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology, offering training opportunities in clinical, research, and teaching settings. The University of Florida's Master of Science in Communication Sciences and Disorders helps students develop clinical competence to treat diverse clients and emphasizes basic and applied research. Master's programs in Speech-Language Pathology offer advanced training in clinical services based on best practices and current research. The Vanderbilt University program, for example, is a comprehensive Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology that prepares students to earn the Certificate of Clinical Competence from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. Students can gain valuable experience through clinical practicums at top hospitals and centers, such as the Vanderbilt Bill Wilkerson Center and Monroe Carrell Children's Hospital. Graduate programs like New York University's Master of Science in Communicative Sciences and Disorders also provide students with opportunities for on-campus and online learning. Online students coordinate with a clinical field placement specialist to complete 375 hours of clinical experience, while on-campus students can add a bilingual extension to their degree by completing two specialized electives. The University of Alabama's Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology emphasizes the importance of assessing, preventing, and treating communication disorders through formal coursework and clinical experience. Students can also pursue a thesis or comprehensive examinations as part of their program, and may qualify for the Alabama Board of Examiners Speech Pathology and Audiology license after graduation. Graduate tuition fees vary between programs, with Vanderbilt University's Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology costing \$47,208 and New York University's Master of Science in Communicative Sciences and Disorders priced at \$42,888. • University of Colorado Boulder offers a Master of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology program to qualify as a speech therapist in diverse settings. • Michigan State University's Masters of Arts in Communicative Sciences and Disorders provides critical thinking and leadership skills for clinical careers. • University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology develops knowledge and skills for assessing and treating communication disorders. • Northwestern University's Master of Science in Speech, Language, and Learning: Speech-Language Pathology Concentration focuses on enhancing abilities to assess and treat speech-language pathologies. The Master's degree programs in Speech-Language Pathology at top-ranked universities offer exceptional training for those seeking a career in communication therapy. The University of Kansas and Northwestern University stand out with their immersive curricula, allowing students to develop leadership skills, critical thinking, and professionalism through hands-on experiences. At the University of Connecticut, students can choose between thesis or non-thesis plans to align with their career goals, while the University of Arizona focuses on rigorous coursework and clinical practice for a meaningful career in the field. The University of Arizona offers a 36-credit hour program that can be completed within two or three years, depending on previous undergraduate experience. The course covers the diagnosis and treatment of various communication disorders across different age groups. Clinical experiences are available both on and off campus, along with opportunities for cutting-edge research under faculty supervision. Topics include speech and language disorders, audiology, and dysphagia, allowing students to also complete an optional thesis. A practicum requirement of 400 hours of speech-language pathology practice is also included. The program holds accreditation from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association's Council on Academic Accreditation. Tuition fees for graduate studies stand at \$11,716 / \$32,065. The two-year Master's program in Speech-Language Pathology at Northeastern University combines theoretical knowledge with practical experience. Students spend their first four semesters completing graduate coursework and participating in supervised clinical practicum. The final semester focuses on off-campus externships, while the fourth semester is dedicated to conducting a total of 16 weeks of clinical practicum. Upon graduation, students are awarded a Certificate of Clinical Competency and qualify for licensure in all 50 US states. The program covers a wide range of topics, including phonological disorders, language disorders, voice disorders, aphasia, stuttering, dysphagia, and others. Students can choose to write a graduate thesis or complete additional elective credit hours to fulfill their requirements. The tuition for this program is \$9,225 per semester. In contrast, the Master of Arts in Speech, Language, and Hearing Sciences at San Diego State University offers a similar two-year curriculum. The program emphasizes clinical practice, scientific theory, and research statistics, with students completing 44 units of coursework and 20 units of clinical practicum. Graduates are qualified to serve as speech-language pathologists in various settings and can obtain the Certificate of Clinical Competence, California licensure, and the Speech-Language Pathology Credential. University programs in Speech-Language Pathology offer graduate degrees that qualify graduates for clinical certification from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. The University of Iowa Master of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology offers rigorous coursework and clinical experience in diverse settings, with students completing the program in five semesters and choosing electives to align with their career goals. Practicum experiences are held in the first four semesters before heading into two full-time, eight-week out-placements. The University of Pittsburgh's Master of Arts/Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology includes coursework and multiple clinical experiences in real-life community settings such as hospitals, private practice, and schools. Second-year students move to outplacement practicum and can select from more than 85 sites working in collaboration with the university's Department of Communication Science and Disorders. The University of Virginia offers a Master's of Education in Communication Sciences and Disorders that provides education and training for a rewarding career in speech pathology. The Master's program in Communication Sciences and Disorders at the University of Georgia is designed for diverse students who need to complete pre-professional coursework before pursuing graduate studies. The program offers thesis and non-thesis options and is accredited by the Council on Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology. Graduate tuition fees range from \$8,704 to \$26,830. Students will engage in coursework, clinical practicum, and "mini-internships," with two full-time placements in medical and public school settings required for completion. The program covers topics such as diagnostics, clinical methods, research, multicultural issues, alternative communication, and dysphagia. The University of Texas at Dallas offers a Master of Science in Communication Disorders, providing evidence-based training in speech-language pathology. Students can participate in faculty research on child language development, autism, bilingualism, speech production, and more. The program is accredited by the Council on Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology. Graduate tuition fees range from \$13,458 to \$26,652 at the University of Utah. Students can choose from multiple pathways to graduate education in communication disorders with the Master of Science / Master of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology. The program offers professional experience and credentials for faculty members. Master's Programs in Speech-Language Pathology Offer Diverse Clinical Experience To pursue a career in speech-language therapy, several graduate programs offer comprehensive training. Students can select from various options, including thesis or non-thesis paths. The Boston University Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology requires foreign language proficiency and offers both thesis and non-thesis tracks. Non-thesis students take a comprehensive final exam. Clinical experience is provided through the university's Speech-Language-Hearing Clinic and at least two externships, with one in a public or private school setting. The program is accredited by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and graduates are eligible for certification and state licensure. Tuition fees range from \$6,988 to \$24,665. The University of Washington's Master of Science in Medical Speech-Language Pathology focuses on human communication processes and disorders. Students learn through coursework and clinical practicum placements in diverse settings with patients across the lifespan. The program culminates with a full-time internship experience and thesis completion. Accreditation is by the Council on Academic Accreditation. The University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign offers a Master of Arts in Clinical & Nonclinical Speech-Language Pathology, providing both certified and non-certified pathways. Clinical students qualify for certification from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. Tuition fees range from \$15,510 to \$27,801. To become a certified speech-language pathologist in public schools, one must complete a rigorous program. The typical requirement is a master's degree with 60 graduate credit hours in various areas such as phonetics, hearing science, and speech science. Students can also customize their degree plan by choosing electives from within or outside the department with advisor approval. Additionally, they must complete at least 400 clock hours of clinical practicum. Those who opt for a non-clinical path will earn a Master of Arts degree but won't be eligible for certification. This route consists of 40 graduate credit hours and an optional thesis. Tuition fees for the program range from \$15,068 to \$28,221. Another option is the Purdue University Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology. As a clinical graduate program, students will qualify for credentialing from organizations such as the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and the Indiana Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology Board. They will also earn the Indiana Department of Education Communication Disorders License. The program prepares students for careers in schools, hospitals, and private practice. Purdue University offers a dual-track degree that combines clinical and research tracks, allowing students to participate in research early on and potentially pursue a doctoral-level degree. The program holds accreditation from the Council on Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology. Tuition fees for Purdue's program are \$9,208 to \$28,010. The University of Wisconsin-Madison also offers a Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology with both thesis and non-thesis options. The 40-credit program can be completed in four semesters by well-prepared students or those with backgrounds in communication sciences and disorders. However, students from other areas may need to complete the university's Post-Bac Program before admission. Clinical experiences take place throughout the University of Wisconsin-Madison program, with a minimum of 100 hours of supervised clinical practice in the second year. Students can complete their clinical hours at the UW Speech and Hearing Clinic or local hospitals, schools, and clinics. Graduates will qualify for clinical certification from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and teacher certification from the state Department of Public Instruction. The University of Wisconsin-Madison's graduate tuition fees range from \$10,728 to \$24,054. Meanwhile, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill offers a Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology with similar requirements and opportunities for clinical certification and further graduate studies. Students considering these programs should weigh their options carefully, taking into account factors such as program length, cost, and availability of clinical experiences. By choosing the right path, aspiring speech-language pathologists can set themselves up for success in this rewarding field. The Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill offers a comprehensive program with two tracks: clinical and non-clinical.
