The website itself is extremely simple and bare-bones to the extreme — it's just a white space with an alphabetical list of titles. As a result, it's very easy to use; just scroll down
the list and find what you want. The downsides? There aren't very many options to pick from, and it lacks many books from languages other than English. It's also not much to look at, and there are no advanced search features to be found here. It's also largely restricted to just reading from the website, which can be a chore. But even with these
