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## Sjsu last day of instruction fall 2024

San José State University is a public research university located in downtown San Jose, California. Established in 1857, it is the oldest public university on the West Coast and serves as the founding campus of the California State University system. The university offers a wide range of academic programs, including 150 bachelor's degree options, 95 master's degrees, and 5 doctoral degrees. SJSU is accredited by the WASC Senior College and University Commission and has a diverse student population, with over 37,000 students enrolled as of fall 2024. The university is classified as an R2 institution, indicating high research spending and doctorate production. SJSU's total enrollment includes nearly 8,600 graduate and credential students, making it one of the most ethnically diverse student populations in the nation. The university's athletic teams, known as the Spartans, compete in the NCAA Division I FBS Mountain West Conference. San José State University has a rich history, dating back to 1857 when the Minns' Evening Normal School was established. Over the years, the university has undergone several name changes and expansions, becoming the California State Normal School in 1862 and eventually merging with the California State College in 1972. Today, SJSU continues to be a leading public research institution, committed to providing high-quality education and research opportunities to its students. San Francisco's public school system partnered with George W. Minns to establish a nascent institution in 1857, which became known as the Minns Evening Normal School. The program operated once a week and graduated 54 female students before securing increased funding due to its success. In 1862, a committee recommended fully funding a state normal school, leading to the California State Senate's decision to provide funding and appoint a board of trustees. The California State Normal School opened on July 21, 1862, but faced challenges with the San Francisco Board of Education over poaching students and withholding facilities. The Normal School relocated several times in San Francisco due to noise complaints, sanitation concerns, and lack of access to proper materials. In 1871, the school moved to San Jose after San Jose Railroad Company offered a tour for the student and faculty body. The campus remains on Washington Square Park at S. 4th and San Carlos Streets. The first building on the site was destroyed in a fire in 1880, prompting Principal Charles H. Allen to request emergency funds from Sacramento. This led to debate about the school's effectiveness, with some advocating for relocation to Los Angeles. However, the California State Assembly opposed this plan, and partial emergency funding was provided for a new building, which finished construction in 1881. The second Normal School Building was rebuilt after being destroyed in the 1906 San Francisco Earthquake, and the California State Normal School Bell was forged in 1881. The San Jose campus was where a large bell was forged to commemorate the school as part of the new building's construction. The bell, which cost \$1,200, was inscribed with "California State Normal School, A.D. 1881" and sounded on special occasions until 1946 when the college got new chimes. Today, the original bell is still on the SJSU campus and is associated with student traditions. After a failed attempt to move the school to Los Angeles, a bill was passed to create a "Branch State Normal School" in Los Angeles, which opened in August 1882 and remained under San Jose's administrative control until 1887. The southern branch eventually became the University of California, Los Angeles. In 1921, the California State Normal School changed its name to the State Teachers College at San Jose, and in 1922, it adopted the Spartans as its official mascot. The school also founded the Justice Studies Department in 1930, which offered the first policing degree in the US. In 1935, the school's name was changed again to San Jose State College. During World War II, the old gym was used to register Japanese Americans before sending them to internment camps. In the 1960s, students and alumni worked to save Tower Hall from demolition, and it was eventually refurbished and reopened in 1966. The tower was renovated again in 2007 and is registered with the California Office of Historic Preservation. The campus also saw a rise in political activism during the 1960s and 1970s, including major protests against the Vietnam War, such as a protest against Dow Chemical Company in 1967 that drew over 3,000 students and bystanders. San Jose State University's (SJSU) history began in the mid-19th century when a school was established on the site. In 1972, the institution was granted university status and its name changed to California State University, San Jose. However, this change was short-lived as the university's name was later changed to San José State University in 1974 due to legislation passed by the California state government. Over time, SJSU has made significant investments in various areas, including education, research, and community development. The English department sponsors the annual Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest, while the CADRE Laboratory for New Media is believed to be one of the oldest media labs in the United States. In 1999, San Jose State and the City of San Jose collabrated on a joint library project, which was completed in 2003. The new library has won several national awards and serves as a model for collaborative efforts between higher education institutions and cities. SJSU has also made significant strides in fundraising, with a record-breaking \$208 million raised during its "Acceleration: the Campaign for San Jose State University" campaign, which was completed ahead of schedule. In 2012, NASA awarded SJSU \$73.3 million to develop systems for improving air and space travel safety. Throughout its history, SJSU has had 32 presidents and principals, with Don Kassing serving as president from 2010-2011. San Jose State University's campus spans approximately 154 acres, with over 55 buildings arranged on a rectangular area in downtown San Jose. Tower Hall, built in 1910, is the oldest structure on campus, followed by the Central Classroom Building as the third oldest. The university's history dates back to 1871 when California State Normal School moved from San Francisco to San Jose. The original campus consisted of several wooden buildings that were destroyed by fire in 1880 and rebuilt using stone and masonry structures in 1881. These four remaining buildings, including Tower Hall, have been preserved and are still standing today. The university invested in a large-scale project that included constructing eight oversized entrance gates around the main campus perimeter.[citation needed] In 2000, the university police department established a new multi-level facility on 7th Street.[citation needed] The Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Library, completed for \$177 million in 2003, received the prestigious Library Journal's Library of the Year award in 2004.[41] This library is an eight-story building with over 1.3 million volumes and serves as a unique collaboration between the university and city government.[citation needed] The King Library took the place of San Jose's first public library, which operated on the same site from 1901 to 1936, and SJSU's Wahlquist Library, which occupied the site from 1961 to 2000.[citation needed] In 2007, a \$2 million renovation of Tower Hall was finished. This historic building is recognized as one of California's Historical Landmarks since 1949.[43] Tower Hall, along with Morris Dailey Auditorium and Washington Square Hall, is among the four oldest structures on campus.[44] The Diaz Compean Student Union features a food court, bookstore, study areas, ballrooms, music room, and game room. A \$90 million expansion and renovation of the student union started in September 2010 and was completed in two phases by August 2015.[45] The university also invested in building new facilities such as a three-story health center at 7th Street and Paseo de San Carlos, which houses various services including counseling and wellness centers. The project cost over \$36 million and finished in March 2015.[45] A renovation of the Spartan Complex was completed for \$55 million in August 2015.[45] The complex is home to recreational spaces, indoor pools, gyms, and other facilities. The main goals were to expand existing structures, bring them up-to-code with current building regulations, address accessibility issues, remove hazardous materials, and correct fire safety concerns.[citation needed] There are also seven residence halls providing on-campus housing for over 4,458 students. SJSU's on-campus housing community comprises seven residence halls, accommodating a combined total of 4,458 students. Upon completion of the third phase of Campus Village, the student housing capacity will increase to 4,928. The projected total cost is approximately \$334 million. In January 2023, the California State University Board of Trustees approved a public-private partnership to transform the Alfred E. Alquist state office building site into new housing for SJSU faculty, staff, and graduate students. The project will feature approximately 1,000 new rental units, with up to half reserved for graduate students. The new development will consist of one or more high-rise structures up to 300 feet tall. The estimated total cost is \$750 million. Construction is projected to begin in late 2024 and be completed in 2027. SJSU is home to the 10,000-square-foot Nuclear Science Facility and the Provident Credit Union Event Center, which seats approximately 5,000 people for athletic events and over 6,500 for concerts. The university also features a new student recreation and aquatic center, opened in April 2019, at a cost of \$132 million. A new interdisciplinary science building was completed in 2023 at a projected cost of \$181 million. It will house teaching labs, research labs, faculty offices, and interdisciplinary spaces totaling 164,000 square feet. SJSU's South Campus is located on the 62-acre site near Downtown San Jose, featuring many athletics facilities, including CEFU Stadium and the Spartan Golf Complex. The South Campus of San José State University is located south of the main campus near 7th Street. It also serves as a parking hub for student overflow and offers shuttle bus services between the two campuses every 10 to 15 minutes from Monday to Thursday. In April 2014, a \$76 million renovation plan was unveiled for the South Campus. The estimated cost was later increased to \$150 million. The project includes the construction of new facilities such as golf training centers, baseball and softball stadiums, outdoor recreation areas, soccer and tennis courts, beach volleyball courts, a multilevel parking garage, a track and field facility, and an added football stadium. The new golf, soccer, and tennis facilities opened in 2017. The softball facility was completed in 2018, followed by the beach volleyball courts in 2019. In 2021, the intramural facility and parking garage were finished along with the first phase of a new baseball facility. The first phase of the football stadium project was completed in August 2023 at an approximate cost of \$70 million. The Spartan Athletics Center is a state-of-the-art facility housing a football operations center, locker rooms, offices, training rooms, and a sports medicine center. It also features soccer team offices, dining facilities, event spaces, and premium viewing areas. Phase II of the project remains in planning stages as of 2023. Other campus facilities include SJSU Simpkins International House, which provides housing for domestic and international students. The university's Department of Aviation and Technology maintains an academic facility at the Reid-Hillview Airport. Additionally, SJSU manages the Moss Landing Marine Laboratories in California, which serves as a research facility for seven CSU campuses. The university offers classes tailored to introducing international students to the English language and American culture. The University Club is a residential facility for faculty, staff, visiting scholars, and graduate students, currently occupied by Alpha Omicron Pi sorority. North Fourth Street houses several institutes and organizations, including the Global Studies Institute and the Mineta Transportation Institute. San Jose State falls under the jurisdiction of the California State University System and has a president appointed by the CSU Chancellor. As of 2023, the university has nine colleges, seven focused schools, and offers various degree programs, including 150 bachelor's degrees, 95 master's degrees, five doctoral degrees, and more. The Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Library holds over 1.6 million volumes. SJSU is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). World Universities Webometrics Ranking ranked SJSU No. 701 globally and No. 200 US colleges and universities (2022). SJSU admission criteria are high school cumulative grade point average (GPA) and standardized test scores. Applicants' California State University eligibility index is calculated based on these factors. Fall 2022 statistics showed 34,783 first-time applications with 26,083 accepted and 4,036 enrolled. Freshmen admission statistics indicate rising applicant numbers but a declining percentage of accepted students. SJSU's admission requirements are strict, so students who meet them aren't guaranteed a spot. Only 30% of freshmen who started in fall 2017 graduated within four years; it took 68% six years to finish their degrees.[110] Transfer students fared better: 33% finished two-year programs in just two years, 69% completed three-year programs, and 80% finished four-year programs. Graduate students also had impressive graduation rates: 52% graduated within two years, 78% within three, and 83% within four.[110] Retention rates were high too - 86% of full-time freshmen returned for their second year, as did 90% of transfer students and 92% of graduate students from the fall 2019 cohort. [110] SJSU is classified as a "High Research Spending and Doctorate Production" university.[13] As of 2022, it employed 2,243 faculty members, with 61% being full-time. In 2023, SJSU's research expenditures reached \$83.4 million, ranking second among CSU campuses and No. 185 nationally.[112] The university has various research collections, including the Ira F. Brilliant Center for Beethoven Studies and the J. Gordon Edwards Entomology Museum. It also partners with organizations like NASA Ames Research Center and the Cisco Networking Laboratory. SJSU is home to the Mineta Transportation Institute and operates the Survey and Policy Research Institute (SPRI). The university has been involved in various research projects, including launching a miniaturized satellite, TechEdSat, in 2012.[116] Since 2014, it's operated the Silicon Valley Big Data and Cybersecurity Center (BDCC), which serves as a cybersecurity research hub. SJSU's Detachment 045, a unit within the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps (AFROTC), fosters collaboration between faculty members from various departments and Silicon Valley tech companies through multidisciplinary partnerships. As one of only two AFROTC detachments in the San Francisco Bay Area, Detachment 045 welcomes "crosstown cadets" from nearby universities like Santa Clara University, Stanford University, and UC Santa Cruz.[117] Students enrolled in SJSU's AFROTC program develop leadership skills and participate in mandatory activities that lead to a commission as an active-duty U.S. military officer. SJSU has a diverse student body, with undergraduate demographics reflecting 35.9% Asian students, 29.6% Hispanic/Latino students, 13.6% White students, and smaller percentages of students from other racial and ethnic backgrounds.[119] The university also attracts students from around the world, with approximately 40% coming from low-income backgrounds and 60% being affluent.[5][120] With a total enrollment of 35,751 students as of fall 2022, SJSU is one of the largest universities in the CSU system. Its student body consists of 26,863 undergraduate students and 8,888 graduate and credential students, with 51% males and 49% females.[4][5] The university offers a range of academic programs and extracurricular activities, including over 475 recognized student organizations that cater to diverse interests and affiliations. Greek life at SJSU is thriving, with 43 social fraternity and sorority chapters managed by Student Involvement, offering students opportunities for personal growth and community engagement.[123][125] The University's Fraternities and Sororities At San José State University, there are over two dozen fraternities and sororities that offer students various ways to get involved. The majority of these organizations align with specific interests, such as academics or community service. For example, the United Sorority and Fraternity Council is responsible for 17 cultural interest groups that cater to diverse student populations. A small percentage of male and female students participate in social fraternities and sororities, respectively. These clubs provide opportunities for members to engage with like-minded individuals while also developing essential life skills. The university's marching band, known as the Pride of the Spartans, showcases its talents at every home football game. This talented group consists of students from various academic backgrounds and even features open university students who are not part of any traditional university program. In addition to sports events, the university has several media outlets that cater to a wide range of interests. The school newspaper, The Spartan Daily, covers local news and provides students with hands-on journalism experience. Another popular student-run radio station is KJSJ, which broadcasts live music and talk shows. San Jose State University boasts an impressive legacy in amateur radio operations, with its W6YL station continuously transmitting for nearly a century. Founded in 1927 as San Jose State Teachers College, the university's amateur radio club has remained one of the oldest student organizations on campus. As a federally licensed radio station, W6YL operates under its unique callsign on various amateur bands. The university's athletic programs, known as the Spartans, have been active since 1890 and compete in the Mountain West Conference within NCAA Division I. San Jose State University has secured numerous national titles across various sports, including track and field, golf, boxing, fencing, and tennis. By December 2022, the university had accumulated ten NCAA Division I team championships and produced an impressive 50 individual champions. Its judo program is renowned internationally, claiming 52 men's and 26 women's National Collegiate Judo Association titles between 1962 and 2024. The university's alumni have achieved outstanding success in various fields, including athletics. They have won a total of 20 Olympic medals, with seven of these being gold medals, dating back to the 1948 Summer Olympics when Willie Steele secured the first gold medal for San Jose State University. Notable alumni include Olympic medalists Lee Evans, Tommie Smith, and John Carlos, who famously raised their fists in protest during the 1968 Summer Olympics. The university's track team, under coach "Bud" Winter, earned the nickname "Speed City," producing talented athletes like Lee Evans, Tommie Smith, and John Carlos. A monument dedicated to their historic moment of protest was erected on Tower Lawn in 2005. Although the track program faced cancellation in 1988 due to budget cuts and Title IX decisions, it was reinstated in 2016. San Jose State University's football team achieved significant milestones in recent years, including its first-ever BCS ranking and national ranking since 1990 after a remarkable 11-2 finish in 2012. The team further improved in the 2020 season, cracking the AP Poll top-25 for the first time since 2012 and securing a conference championship title. Beyond NCAA Division I sports programs, San Jose State University has an active club sports community comprising approximately 25 sports and 50 teams, making it a hub for various athletic pursuits. Spartan sports teams at SJSU are managed and organized by student volunteers despite a few well-established teams employing full-time coaches who receive strong support from alumni. The available club sports include archery, badminton, baseball, basketball, bowling, boxing, cycling, dancesport, dragon boat racing, esports, fencing, figure skating, gymnastics, ice hockey, judo, lacrosse, mountain biking, powerlifting, quidditch, roller hockey, rugby, soccer, softball, swimming, track and field, triathlon, ultimate Frisbee, volleyball, water polo, and wrestling. The iconic Boccardo Gate stands on the Paseo de San Carlos, home to an old campus bell purchased in 1881 for \$1,217. The bell chimed every morning until the 1906 earthquake stopped it. A specially designed bell housing was built into Tower Hall in 1909. It rang during special events until new carillon chimes were acquired in 1946. The university's official mascot is the Spartan, adopted in 1922 from the State Teachers College at San Jose. The school colors are gold and white, established prior to 1925 when students debated changing them. Blue was added as an official color later. According to old yearbooks, Spardi Gras began in 1929 on George Washington's birthday and ran until 1960. Spartan Revelries, an all-student musical event, may have started around the same time. Sparta Camp was an annual event hosted by the Associated Students at Asilomar State Beach from 1953 to 1965. The retreat focused on leadership development and was open to students with an interest in student government, who had to apply to attend. Participants engaged in workshops and discussion groups. A similar Freshman Camp was held every September to help new students get oriented to the campus. The university's chimes, a gift from 1947, are Westminster chimes that ring the same tones as Big Ben. Students show Spartan pride by wearing blue and gold every Thursday. Homecoming week features various events leading up to the football game at CEFU Stadium. Crown Worldwide Group CEO James E. Thompson, a billionaire, is an alumnus of San Jose State University. Notable companies founded by SJSU students and alumni include Dolby Laboratories, Intel Corporation, Specialized Bicycle Components, Oracle Corporation, Seagate Technology, and WhatsApp. The university has also produced famous musicians such as Lindsey Buckingham and Stevie Nicks from Fleetwood Mac, Doug Clifford and Stu Cook from Creedence Clearwater Revival, Tom Johnston and Patrick Simmons from the Doobie Brothers, and Paul Kantner from Jefferson Airplane. SJSU alumni have also made significant contributions in fields like literature, fashion design, sports, and politics.
